Meigs County Middle School is centrally located in the Volunteer Energy Cooperative service region in Decatur, Tennessee. Once you get to Highway 58 in Decatur turn east on Z Street (across from Piggly Wiggly), left on Main Street, and right into the Meigs Middle School parking lot. Or you can just follow the signs – there will be plenty of signs pointing you in the right direction once you arrive in the Decatur area.

To Decatur from:

Kingston: Follow Highway 58 heading south into Decatur. Turn left on Z Street, left on Main Street, and right into Meigs Middle School.

Crossville: Take Highway 127 South out of Crossville. Follow Highway 27/68 over Watts Bar Dam. Make a right turn onto Highway 58, go nine miles, turn left on Z Street, left on Main Street, and right into Meigs Middle School.

Cleveland: Take Highway 60 to the intersection with Highway 58. Turn right onto Highway 58 and follow to Decatur. Turn right on Z Street, left on Main Street, and right into Meigs Middle School.

Athens: Take Highway 30 to Decatur. At the intersection with Highway 58, turn right. Turn right on Z Street, left on Main Street, and right into Meigs Middle School.

2016 Washington Youth Tour

Nearly 140 high school seniors from across Tennessee have returned from a weeklong "experience of a lifetime" courtesy of their local electric cooperatives, Joshua Laster of Alvin C. York Institute, Hunter Blake Chastain of Polk County High School, Taylor Nixon of Meigs County High School, and Katherine Torrance of Cumberland County High School were sponsored by Volunteer Energy Cooperative to participate in the 2016 Washington Youth Tour June 10-16.

The popular event included sightseeing, visits with elected officials and lots of fun meeting peers from across Tennessee and the nation. Delegates earned their spots on the Youth Tour by writing winning short stories titled "Electric Cooperatives: Powering Everyday Life." In their winning entries, the talented young writers described how member-owned, nonprofit electric coops strengthen their local communities and improve lives across their service areas while providing safe, reliable, affordable energy.

"We take great pride in rewarding the best and brightest from our service area," said Julie Jones, Volunteer Energy Communication and Public Relations Coordinator, a chaperone on this year's trip. "By recognizing their accomplishments through programs like the Washington Youth Tour, we show these leaders of tomorrow that their hometown electric co-op is more than a utility provider; Volunteer Energy Cooperative is an active member of the community and fully invested in its prosperity."

For more than 50 years, the Washington Youth Tour has taken students from electric co-op service areas to our nation's capital to learn more about our country and the cooperative business model. The annual event is coordinated by Volunteer Energy, the Tennessee Electric Cooperative Association and National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA). This year's Youth Tour involved 1,700 students from 43 states.

"Young Americans given the opportunity to come to Washington, D.C., by their electric cooperatives experience a life-changing event," said NRECA Interim CEO Jeffrey Connor. "They talk to their elected officials in person, connect to our nation's rich history and have a hands-on experience with democracy. Youth Tour enriches their understanding of the political process and the vital importance of direct engagement. As a result, they return to their communities with a deeper commitment to the communities they represent."

On their 2016 visit, Tennessee's Youth Tour delegates saw the White House and memorials to past presidents Thomas Jefferson, Abraham Lincoln and Franklin Delano Roosevelt as well as monuments honoring the sacrifices of veterans of World War II and the Vietnam and Korean Wars. During visits to the museums of the Smithsonian Institution, the touring Tennesseans saw and experienced natural, historical and artistic treasures. Other fun stops

included historic homes of former presidents — George Washington's Mount Vernon and Jefferson's Monticello — as well as Madame Tussauds Wax Museum, the Hard Rock Cafe and a boat cruise down the Potomac River. Among other Youth Tour highlights were a solemn and sobering visit to Arlington National Cemetery where the group laid a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknowns and a stirring Sunset Parade performance by the U.S. Marine Drum and Bugle Corps and Marine Corps Silent Drill Platoon.

The group was welcomed to the U.S. Capitol by Sens. Lamar Alexander and Bob Corker, and Rep. Diane Black, Rep. Chuck Fleischmann, and Rep. Scott Dejarlais spent time with their young constituents from Volunteer Energy Cooperative, posing for photos and answering questions.

Katherine Torrance from Volunteer Energy Cooperative was awarded a \$2,000 Robert McCarty Memorial Scholarship for having the second place essay out of the more than 10,000 papers submitted across the state. McCarty was an employee of Volunteer Energy Cooperative and long-time chaperone on the annual youth tour. Robert lost his battle with cancer in 2015, and sponsoring cooperatives renamed the scholarship in honor of his love for young people. This was the first time a Volunteer Energy Cooperative Student placed in the annual essay contest in recent memory, and was a fitting tribute to

"The Washington Youth Tour is one way we show the youth of our service area that Volunteer Energy is more than their electricity provider. We genuinely care about the prosperity of our communities, and that includes providing special opportunities for these exceptional students and preparing them for future success."

Tennessee Electric Cooperatives Visit D.C. Lawmakers

Members from Volunteer Energy Cooperative visited with Rep. Diane Black, Rep. Scott Dejarlis, and Rep. Chuck Fleischmann on Thursday, June 23, in Washington, D.C. They joined more than 40 co-op leaders from across the state meeting with Tennessee's Congressional delegation.

"An important part of our mission to provide affordable and reliable energy is educating our elected officials about co-ops," says Mike Frazier, a director with Volunteer Energy Cooperative. "These visits help them better understand the issues that concern co-ops and co-op members."

"Elected representatives make decisions and pass laws that have serious consequences for Tennessee's electric cooperatives and their members," says David Callis, executive vice president of the Tennessee Electric Cooperative Association. "It is important that we tell the electric cooperative story and inform Members of Congress of the impact of proposed legislation."

Co-op members discussed environmental and power supply issues with members of Congress during their visits. "It is important that we communicate with how legislation affects rates and reliability for everyday Tennesseans," says Callis.
