## Help Keep America Beautiful

Posting Signs on Utility Poles is Dangerous and Illegal

With thousands of volts of electricity above and unforgiving ground below, linemen have

plenty of safety concerns to consider when they start climbing a utility pole. Illegally posted signs and flyers make their lives that much more difficult.

Volunteer Energy Cooperative asks that you stop to consider the potential hazards and then refrain from posting signs and/or flyers on utility poles.

It's not just a matter of distracting drivers and creating an eyesore, these can pose a real safety threat – especially at night. We've had some pretty serious injuries at VEC due to these and across the nation there have even been some lineman fatalities that are directly attributable to sign and flyers.

Linemen have been injured when they snagged staples and nails used to mount signs on utility poles. Even more serious injuries result when linemen's climbing spikes hit a nail or staple preventing their climbing spikes from digging in as they need to. This has resulted in falls.

Some people may have the misconception that the vast majority of work linemen do is performed out of a bucket truck. Many people would be surprised to find out how much linemen still climb, especially when the ground is wet and we want to avoid damaging people's yards.

Not only are these signs a distraction and a safety concern, they are also illegal. State law (TCA 2-19-144) prohibits anyone from placing signs on utility poles unless they have been legally authorized to do so.

## TVA Announces Fuel Cost Adjustment in April

The Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) recently announced that it will apply a .091 cent per kilowatt hour (KWh) fuel charge adjustment beginning April 1 for residential customers.

The fuel cost adjustment (FCA), which appears as a line item on the VEC electric bills, will mean an increase of about \$1 to \$1.50 for the average residential customer.

VEC will be forced to pass this increase along to customers. TVA adjusts the FCA each quarter based on the difference between TVA's budgeted fuel cost for the quarter and the most recent forecast amount. The FCA was designed to help reduce the need for rate increases in the future by better matching revenues to changes in costs for fuel and purchased electricity.

VEC President/CEO Rody Blevins said VEC is forced to pass along the FCA to customers, but said VEC is simply passing along the charge and is gaining no additional revenue through the FCA.

"This is strictly a pass-along item," Blevins said. "We have added a line item on our VEC bills to show each customer exactly how much the FCA is impacting their bill. We hate to pass any type of increase along to our customers, but I am somewhat relieved that the second quarter's FCA is relatively small."

The adjustment will be .091 cents per KWh for residential customers and for outdoor lighting. The adjustment for general power customers – part 1 will be .090 cents per KWh. General power – part 2 customers will see a .090-cent adjustment per KWh for the first 15,000 KWh and an adjustment of .088 for additional kilowatt hours, General power – part 3 customers will receive a .088 cent per KWh adjustment and all other industrial customers will receive a .087 cent per KWh adjustment.
