Watch Out for Scammers

Unfortunately, in today's world, scams are inevitable. Scammers can threaten you with everything from legal action involving the IRS to turning off power to your home.

Utility scams often involve an individual or group posing as an employee of your electric cooperative. The scammer may use threatening language to frighten you into offering your credit card or bank account information. Don't fall victim to these types of scams.

Understand the threats posed and your best course of action:

- If someone calls your home or cellphone demanding you pay your electric bill immediately, gather as much information as you can from that individual, hang-up the phone and contact the local authorities. Scammers often use threats and urgency to pressure you into giving them your bank account number or loading a prepaid credit or debit card. If you have any doubt about your utility bill, contact our member payment center either in person or over the phone.
- If someone comes to your home claiming to be an employee of Volunteer Energy Cooperative (VEC) that needs to collect money or inspect parts of your property, call us to verify they are, in fact, an employee. If they are not verified, call local authorities for assistance. Do not let the individual into your home.

There are other types of scams consumers should watch out for:

- Government agencies like the IRS will never call to inform you that you have unpaid taxes or other liens against you. You will always receive this type of information in the mail. If someone calls claiming to be the IRS, hang-up immediately.
- If you receive an email from an unknown sender; an email riddled with spelling errors and typos; or an email threatening action unless a sum of money is paid, do not click any links provided within the email, and do not respond to the email. Just delete the email, or send it to your spam folder.
- If someone calls your home claiming to have discovered a virus on your computer, hang-up. This caller intends to access personal information you may be keeping on your computer.


Volunteer Energy Cooperative wants to make sure you avoid any types of scams that could put you or your financial information in

VEC College Scholarship Deadline is March 8th


Volunteer Energy Cooperative (VEC) wants to reward students who have used their time and talents to benefit their local communities. VEC's Lillard-Shadow scholarship program rewards academic and community service achievements by awarding four \$2,000 scholarships to students who will graduate from high schools in VEC's service area in the spring of 2019.



Four awards of \$500 per semester each (renewable for up to four semesters) will be presented to spring 2019 high school graduates whose parents or guardians are VEC customers. Applications will be judged by an independent panel based on each student's community service activities and citizenship - 40%; written communication skills -20 %; financial need – 25%; and academic achievement – 15%.



VEC Receives 2018 Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) POWER Initiative Grant

Over the summer of 2018, Volunteer Energy Cooperative (VEC) applied for several grants to aid in the cost of construction for its commercial broadband pilot. While some of the grants applied for are still outstanding, we are pleased to announce that VEC is one of the recipients of the 2018 Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) POWER Initiative Grant. ARC has awarded 35 grants totaling \$26.5 million, of which VEC will receive \$1.5 million to put toward its commercial broadband effort. This money will be split between VEC and its strategic partners, with \$1 million going to aid in the cost of construction, including smart grid enhancements, and another \$500,000 going toward grid virtualization and entrepreneurial development.

VEC will match the \$1 million portion of the grant with an additional \$1 million, and the \$2 million total will be utilized to run fiber to the Birchwood Community of Hamilton and Meigs counties. Thanks to the ARC grant, 731 homes will gain access to gigabit internet service. The broadband service expansion will include areas surrounding Highway 60, between Highway 58 and the Tennessee River. To see details of the area to be covered in graphic form, please visit www.vec-twinlakes. com. The fiber areas affected will be the zones labeled Georgetown, Blythe Ferry, and Parker Loop. Construction in these areas began during the winter months of late 2018.

The VEC broadband pilot began in December 2017, and currently provides internet, television, and telephone access to 137 homes on Bigsby Creek Road and inside Camelot subdivision, to 228 homes on No Pone Road and Van Davis Road, and soon to an additional 251 homes across the No Pone and Van Davis communities.
