call center representative. Another advantage is staying busy. In 2019, representatives answered approximately 14,000 calls per month.

The Call Center is open for extended business hours: Monday through Friday 8 a.m. - 7 p.m. and Saturday 8 a.m. - noon. Each representative can take payments, review billing questions, create service repair orders, answer outage questions, and discuss bill payment options.

"Volunteer Energy, how may I help you?" asks Lisa, VEC call center representative. Lisa is one of nine different customer service representatives that answer the phone at the contact/ call center. Contact/call center representatives are the voice of VEC in many cases and the first contact of new members with questions.

Contact/call center

representatives answer the phones for all VEC service centers across the 17 counties in our service area. Representatives train and maintain a varied skill set to assist members. Vice President of Operations, Melvin Holmes says, "I am very proud to get to work with such a dedicated and talented group of people." He went on to say, "I hope with every call, members are getting the service they demand."

The VEC mission is to provide our customers with reliable, safe, and efficient services in a courteous and timely manner at a competitive cost. Contact/call center representatives take this mission and their responsibilities seriously. They want to help. If a representative does not have an answer, they will contact other resources at VEC until they resolve your concern.

Often representatives speak with members monthly as they take bill payments. While never meeting face to face, representatives often connect personally with members. Kristy, who also worked in the dispatch control center, remembers when a customer called to make a payment and asked, "Didn't you used to work the night shift?"

VECustomers Share is a program that rounds up your electric bill to the nearest dollar. Combining your contribution with other members' we can provide grants to deserving community organizations. The average amount a customer gives over 12 months is \$5.50. Over the last 19 years, our members' change has added up. Since October 2001, VECustomers Share has given out \$6,967,908.00 in grants. Board members distribute funds into 11 different service districts: Bledsoe/Rhea, Fentress/Morgan/Scott, Meigs, Roane/Loudon, White/Putnam/Overton, Bradley, Hamilton, Pickett, Cumberland, McMinn, and Polk.

VECustomers Shares is a grant program funded through the rounding up of member's bills to the nearest dollar.

In return for the rounded up change from our members, we contribute to organizations across our 17 county service area. In March, VECustomers Share Grants totaled \$21,600. Organized in 2001, qualifying organizations have received over 6.9 million.

Monterey Mission Center is one of the organizations that received a grant. Established at the end of 2017, MMC gives away food twice a month at Hope and Christ Fellowship. Approximately 250 families receive food at each distribution. In 2018 -2019, they distributed food to 8,404 families. This food reached 12,326 individuals.

MMC is entirely volunteer-based. In the words of MMC Director
