The following candidates have gualified to run for positions on the Volunteer Energy Cooperative board of directors in districts where the current directors' terms of office is expiring. Voting ballots for the District 4 elections will be mailed on August 20. The election in District 3 and 7 is not contested.

District 3 – Hamilton County

Aubie Smith

Aubie Smith, a native of Ooltewah, is the incumbent District 3 board member. He operates a 400-acre farm specializing in beef cattle. In addition to farming, Smith is a school bus contractor for Hamilton County Schools.



Lillard Shadow Scholarship Awarded to Four Exceptional Graduating Seniors

Volunteer Energy Cooperative recognized four exceptional graduating seniors for their commitment to community service and their academic achievements by awarding them with VEC's 2021 Lillard-Shadow Scholarships.



The Lillard-Shadow Scholarship program was endowed to honor J.W. Lillard and Willis A. Shadow. Lillard and Shadow were dedicated to improving the lives and livelihoods of community residents through electric power. Committed to public service and community involvement, they both were instrumental in the organization of the Meigs County Electric Membership Corporation in 1933. This organization eventually evolved into Volunteer Energy Cooperative.

Each year an independent panel of education professionals judge applications for Lillard-Shadow Scholarships mainly based on students' demonstrated commitment to community service. The \$2,000 scholarship to attend the college of his or her choice was awarded to Jonathan Bailey, Bryce McKenzie, Katherine Stokes and Megan Tillis.

Jonathan Bailey is the son of Boyd and Paula Bailey. He is a graduate of Cumberland County High School (CCHS) and plans to attend the University Of Tennessee Tickle College Of Engineering. Jonathan is graduating sixth in a class of more than 200. Through the CCHS Beta Club, he has participated in multiple community service activities, including helping at local homeless shelters, tutoring students, and raising funds for local support agencies. In addition to his Beta Club service, after the tornadoes in

March 2020, he prepared and packaged emergency supplies for the Nashville tornado victims and first responders. Jonathan also teaches Chess after school at a local elementary school chess club. Jonathan competed at the state and regional chess tournaments. "An excellent student and a great young man," is how his teacher described him.

Bryce McKenzie is the son of Ruben and Michele McKenzie. Bryce graduated from Meigs County High School (MCHS) with a 4.0 and was the class valedictorian. He plans to attend the University of Tennessee at Knoxville, majoring in chemistry/pre-med. Bryce participated in multiple community service activities. professional, and wise beyond his years". Katherine Stokes is the daughter of Avery and Vivian Stokes. She graduated from Clarkrange High School and now plans to attend Tennessee Technological University. Katherine was ranked first out of 67 students and held a 4.0-grade-point average. Katherine's community service included working with the Interact Club's Chicken Run and Festival. This is a local community race in which proceeds help fund public service

projects, providing wheelchairs to children, polio research and other charitable efforts. Each Christmas, Katherine also participated in helping with the Christmas Shopping spree for children from lowincome families.
